YMCA varsity losing institutions

Left with only eight colleges | Financial crisis, technical issues to blame

The JC Bose University of Science and Technology, YMCAs, Faridabad, one of the premier universities of the state offering science and technology courses, is fast "losing" affiliated institutions. The university has been left with just 45 per cent of the institutions which had been affiliated to it in 2017.

While financial crisis, mismanagement and technical issues are to be blamed, it is left with only eight colleges at present. The issue of affiliations to the university is just three years old. A total of 18 colleges, mostly offering technical and engineering courses, had been attached in 2017.

Though it was upgraded as

a state university in 2009, it was renamed JC Bose University of Science and Technology, YMCAs, in 2018. It was accredited as A-grade university by the NAAC in 2016.

However, the university has been faced with a crisis in view of the sharp downfall in the number of colleges affiliated to it. Of the total 18 institutions, it has been left with only eight of those.

Of the 10 institutions that it lost in this period, four have closed down. Another five have migrated or are in the process of shifting to another university. One private institution got disaffiliated last year due to alleged violation of norms. The number threatens to go down further as another private engineering college having 362 students is

also faced with closure. Students of this college had approached the university recently with a request to be adjusted somewhere else. It is alleged that teaching has

been stopped as the staff is not getting salaries. A university team in a surprise check found the office of the college closed on Wednesday. “The committee formed to probe the matter is likely to submit its report in a couple of days,” said an official of the university. Earlier, a private engineering college had got engaged in a legal battle after the university announced its disaffiliation in October last.

Admitting to a decline in the affiliated institutions, Dr Dinesh Kumar, VC, YMCAs University, said the university had been doing well in view of rise in students’ strength to 5,000 from 2,200. The staff has also risen to 180 from 100 since 2017. “While the university has been allotted 18 acres recently, the number of courses offered has also more than doubled,” he said.
