Subject: Report on Two-day International Conference in Transmedia Storytelling (TS'26)

The Department of Literature and Languages at J.C. Bose University of Science and Technology, YMCA, Faridabad, organized a two-day transdisciplinary international conference titled "**Transmedia Storytelling: Narratives, Discourse and Dissemination (TS'26)**" in alliance with **The Shakespeare Association, India** and All India Forum for English Students, Scholars and Trainers (AIFEST) as knowledge partners. The conference was successfully accomplished under the kind aegis of the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor, Prof Rajive Kumar on **February 18-19, 2026**. The event was conducted in a **hybrid mode**, allowing for both global and local participation and was facilitated by the Research and Development department. Prof Ajay Ranga and Prof Anuradha Sharma, Dean, Faculty of Liberal Arts and Media Studies were the co-patrons.

The event provided a platform to discuss how narratives serve as a linchpin in fields as diverse as creative production, management strategies, and even hardcore science—making complex facts "accessible, digestible and comprehensible" through storytelling.



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The event in which a hundred and twenty (120) scholars and researchers participated and about ninety-five (95) papers were presented served as a vibrant intellectual hub **where renowned scholars, eminent guests, and enthusiasts from around the world gathered to share their insights and engage in thought-provoking discussions** on the multifaceted nature of narratives in the digital age. Moving beyond traditional boundaries, the discourse centered on the timeless power of transmedia storytelling, exploring how stories evolve and sustain their impact as they migrate across diverse media platforms—from classical texts to generative AI and immersive digital environments.

Inaugural Session

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Prof. Divyajyoti Singh, Convener of the Conference and Chairperson of the Department of Literature and Languages (Faculty of Liberal Arts and Media Studies, JC Bose UST) introduced the conference theme and tracks. She further expressed profound gratitude to the university leadership and the academic community for the opportunity to host such a significant international gathering. Introducing the core themes of the conference, Prof. Singh emphasized that the event was designed to explore the **posthumanist framework** and the **cognitive paradigms** that define modern storytelling. In her address, she highlighted the institutional pride in providing a platform for global scholars to discuss the evolving dynamics of narrative dissemination.

The exposition was followed by a keynote address by Prof. Margit Koves, Visiting Professor, Dept of Slavonic-and Finno –Ugrian Studies, University of Delhi.

Prof Koves examined the fluidity of narratives as they transition from prose into film, painting, and theater. Through her presentation, titled "**Transmedia Storytelling and Intermedial Transformations in the Work of Laszlo Krasznahorkai.**" The discussion centered on the works of the 2025 Nobel laureate highlighting his extensive interdisciplinary connections. The paper detailed the adaptation of Krasznahorkai's novels—such as *Satantango* (1986) and *The Melancholy of Resistance* (1989)—and short stories like "The Turin Horse" into films by the acclaimed director **Béla Tarr**.

A pivotal claim of the presentation was that the relationship between these different art forms should be viewed as a **continuous dialogue** rather than a simple adaptation.

The Presidential Remarks were delivered by **the Chief Guest of the session, Professor Bhim Singh Dahiya**, Vice-Chancellor (Erst.) Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra. In his address, he lauded the department's initiative in organizing a conference of such contemporary relevance. Professor Dahiya expressed high commendation for the Convener, Prof. Divyajyoti Singh, acknowledging her vision and dedication in successfully conceptualizing and



executing an event that spectacularly bridges the gap between traditional academic disciplines and modern transmedia discourse.

The **Inaugural Session** was attended by Professor Prassanshu Director, Centre for Linguistic Justice and Endangered Languages (CLJEL), NLU Dwarka, Delhi, **Professor Nibir K. Ghosh**, D. Litt., UGC Emeritus Professor (Agra College) and Editor-in-Chief of the international journal *Re-Markings* was the Guest of Honour. As a Senior Fulbright Fellow, Professor Ghosh brought a wealth of international academic experience to the proceedings, providing a structured and insightful opening to the conference discussions.

The session was further elevated by the **Address of the Chief Patron, Professor Rajive Kumar**, Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor of JC Bose UST. Professor Kumar emphasized the university's commitment to fostering innovation at the intersection of liberal arts and technology. He highlighted the importance of such transdisciplinary platforms in preparing students and researchers for the "convergence culture" of the digital age, where storytelling remains the primary vehicle for human connection and knowledge dissemination.

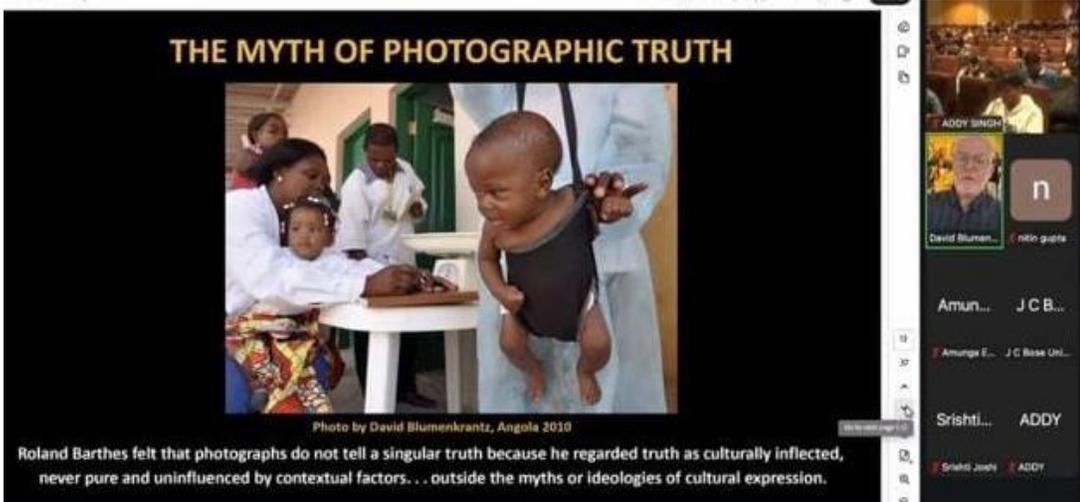

Plenary Session-I: Settlers, Subalterns and Indigeneity-Discourse and Hegemony: Probing Narratives with AI

The first plenary session, held on February 18, 2026, focused on the critical theme: "**Settlers, Subalterns and Indigeneity—Discourse and Hegemony: Probing Narratives with AI.**" This session was chaired by **Prof. Rashmi Attri**, Department of English, Aligarh Muslim University, with **Prof. NeerKanwal Mani** (Retd. Principal, Govt. College, Mohana) serving as Co-Chair. The session was conducted under the patronage of **Prof. Ajay Ranga**, Registrar and Professor of Law at JC Bose UST.

The highlight of the session was a presentation by **Prof. David Blumenkrantz** from California State University, Northridge (USA), titled "**Reclaiming Agency through Photographic Representations.**" His paper explored the power of the visual medium in restorative storytelling, arguing that photography can serve as a vital tool for marginalized communities to reclaim their narratives and challenge hegemonic structures. This discussion directly aligned with the conference's goal of investigating how different media forms—from traditional photography to AI-driven analysis—alter the dissemination and reception of human discourse.

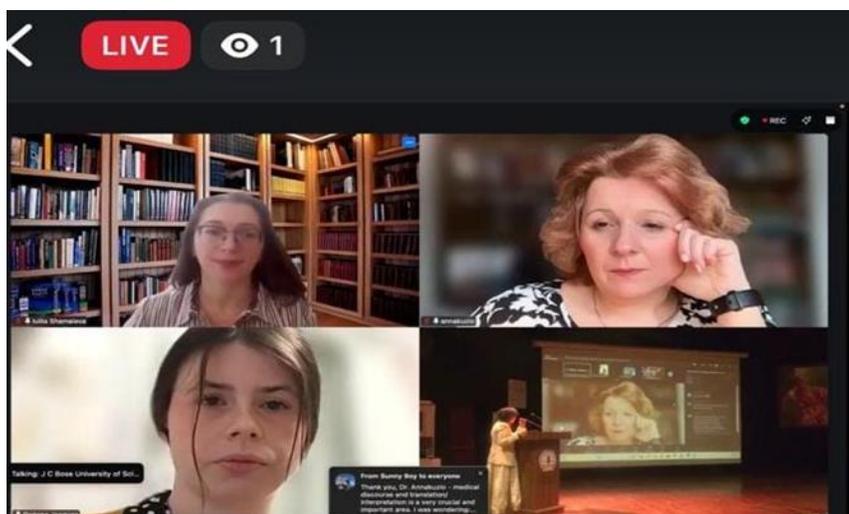
Prof. Ahmar Mahboob, Associate Professor, University of Sydney, Australia presented a compelling discourse on **“The Amplifier: A Transmedia Journal as Subaltern Practice.”** His discussion focused on how transmedia platforms can function as "amplifiers" for voices that are often silenced in traditional discourse, aligning with the conference's exploration of **cognitive and emotiological paradigms** in modern storytelling.

The Presidential remarks were delivered by Prof RK Verma, Sri Aurobindo College, University of Delhi (DU), India. Prof. Verma contended that the presentations collectively reinforced the conference’s goal of investigating how diverse media forms—ranging from traditional photography to digital journals and AI-driven analysis—fundamentally alter the dissemination and reception of human discourse.

Second Plenary Session (Europe and the World)

Prof. Iulia Shamaieva and Dr. Anna M Kuzio contributed their expertise to enrich the discussions with nuanced insights in the Second Plenary Session held on February 18, 2026. The session was chaired by Prof. Jyoti K. Verma, Former Head, Dayalbagh Educational Institute, Agra and co-chaired by Prof Maneesha Garg, Director, R&D, JC Bose UST. The session brought together international experts to offer nuanced perspectives on the cognitive and semiotic dimensions of global narratives.

The first speaker, Prof Iulia Shamaieva, Associate Professor, Department of Foreign Languages for Professional Purposes, VN Kharkiv National University, Kharkiv, Ukraine delivered an intricate presentation titled **“Multimodality of Emotions as a Dimension of Transmedia Storytelling: A Fractal Semiotics Perspective.”** Her discourse integrated the conference's core focus on **emotiological paradigms**, exploring how emotions are not just expressed but structured as multi-layered, fractal patterns across different media. This provided a complex theoretical framework for understanding how audience engagement is sustained in transmedia networks.

The session was further enriched by the expertise of **Dr. Anna M. Kuzio**, Assistant Professor Poznańska Akademia Medyczna, Poland, whose insights fostered a vibrant cross-cultural dialogue, bridging European academic traditions with the broader international discourse of the conference. She delivered a presentation titled, **“Medical Discourse as a Site of Intercultural Negotiation: Implications for Interpreter-Mediated Communication.** Her presentation provided a sophisticated analysis of how emotions are architecturally structured as multi-layered, fractal patterns that resonate across diverse media platforms.

The session was jointly moderated by Prof Divyajyoti Singh and **Ms. Oceane Jacques**, a research student pursuing a Master's degree in English Studies at the **Université de Bretagne Occidentale, France**. Ms. Jacques is currently developing her Master's thesis on the application of transmedia storytelling within the musical projects of the American duo **Twenty One Pilots**. Her participation in the conference served a dual purpose: contributing her emerging expertise to the discourse and fulfilling a core requirement of her degree program, which mandates that students participate in the organization of academic events and produce a subsequent reflective report based on the experience. The Presidential remarks were delivered by Prof. Nibir K Ghosh, Editor *Re-Markings*.

Complementing the rigorous academic discourse, the conference hosted a visual exhibition that brought the concept of "Transmedia" to life through the lens of creative practitioners. A major highlight was the **Travel Photography Exhibition by Dr. Deepti Singh Gupta**, Author, *My Suitcase Heart*. The exhibition provided an opportunity to the participants to journey through diverse landscapes and cultural narratives captured across the globe. Furthermore, the conference provided a platform for the next generation of storytellers through a dedicated **Creative Projects Display by Post-Graduate Students of English**.

The event was truly transdisciplinary as the academic approach was balanced by experimental work in different media including a travel photography exhibition, a narrative game demonstration 'Philosophers vs Philosophy', 'SDG inspired artefacts' exhibition by Masters of English students.



The very fact that participation was made in hybrid modes including physical lectures, live streaming and online presentations also underscores the overarching conference topic, ‘Transmedia Storytelling’.

The student projects included models of the Temple of Athena, The Globe Theatre, a lighthouse, Indian adaptations of matryoshka dolls made from re-used plastic, an AI-Human interface underlining posthumanism, a handcrafted board bricolage ‘sophomore’ resembling the conference mascot, a flying bird reminiscent of peacock that feasts on learning.

Third Plenary Session: Rhetoric in Narrative: From Argumentation to Persuasion

The afternoon session on February 18, 2026, delved into the strategic use of rhetoric across diverse professional and cultural landscapes.

The occasion was further graced by **Professor Prasannanshu**, Director of the Centre for Linguistic Justice and Endangered Languages (CLJEL) at the National Law University, Dwarka, New Delhi. In his capacity as a presiding dignitary, he contributed his expertise on the intersections of law, linguistics, and the vital role of narrative in protecting endangered cultural identities. The session was held under the patronage of **Prof. Ajay Ranga**, **Professor of Law** and Registrar, JC Bose UST who reflected on the tensions between the social conventions and constitutional law in India.

The session featured a multidisciplinary panel of experts. In the field of **Legal Narratives and Climate Advocacy**, **Sh. Jeetinder Gupta**, Advocate, Supreme Court of India, presented on **“Climate Litigation and Media Narrative.”** He examined how legal arguments are translated into public discourse, emphasizing the role of media in shaping the urgency of environmental justice.

Dr. Phool Kumar Malik (Assistant Professor, University of Lille, France) offered a perspective on **“Rhetoric of Advertisement and Marketing Discourse.”** He analyzed how persuasive narratives are constructed in global marketing to influence consumer behavior and brand identity.

Prof. Jyoti K. Verma (DEI, Agra) delivered a didactic exploration of the **“Indian Knowledge System (IKS) and the Re-centering of Literary Criticism,”** advocating for a return to indigenous frameworks in understanding and evaluating narratives. The session was chaired by **Prof. Arvind Gupta** (Chairperson, Mechanical Engineering, JC Bose UST),

Following the third plenary session, the day reached its cultural zenith with **"JHULNA,"** a captivating indigenous ballad performance. This session was strategically organized to showcase transmedia in its most traditional and visceral form—the oral tradition—illustrating how narratives migrate through time and memory long before the advent of digital platforms.

The event was expertly coordinated by **Prof. Arvind Gupta** (Chairperson, ME) and conducted under the guidance of Session Chair **Sh. Jagdish Balaji** (Educationist), Co-Chair **Prof. Pradeep Dimri** (Dean, Student Welfare), and Session Patron **Prof. Manjeet Singh** (Dean, FET).

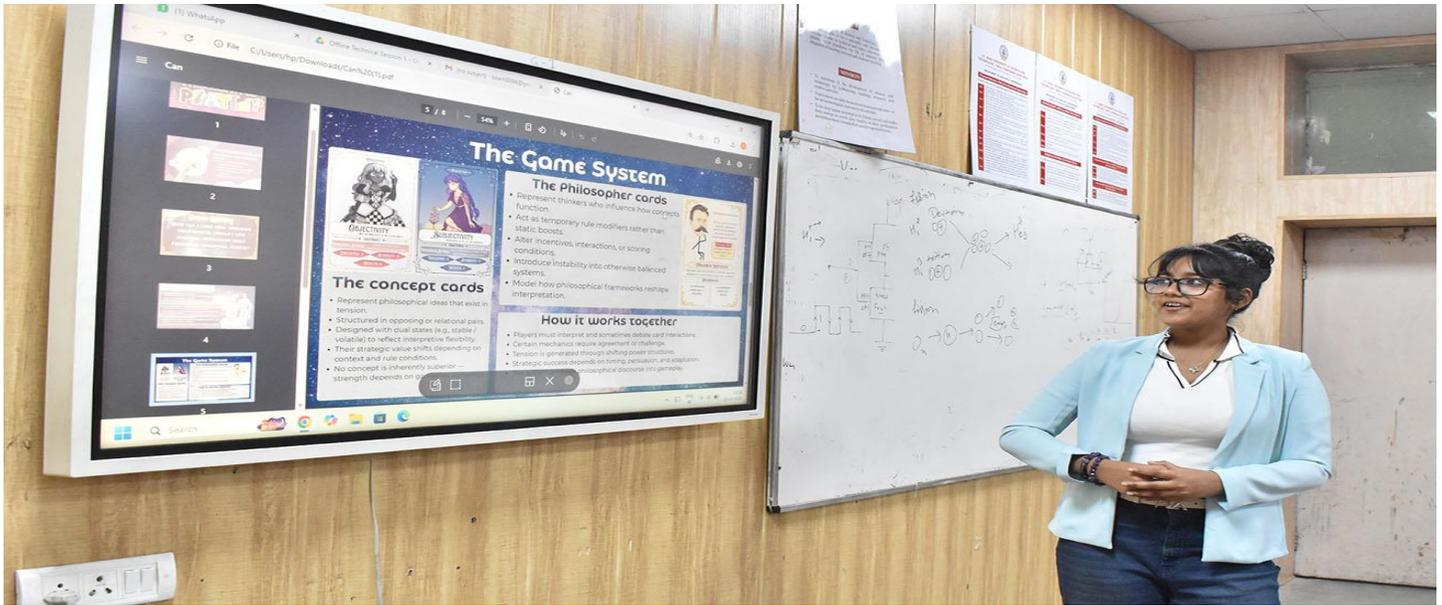

Technical Online Sessions

The morning commenced with **Parallel Technical Online Sessions** before transitioning into **Plenary Session IV** at 11:00 AM. This session featured a multidisciplinary exploration of transmedia. A total of **54** participants presented their research papers.

Plenary Session IV

Plenary Session IV of the International Conference (TS'26) convened with the umbrella theme **"Myth to Modernity"** commenced at **11:00 AM** at the **University Auditorium**. 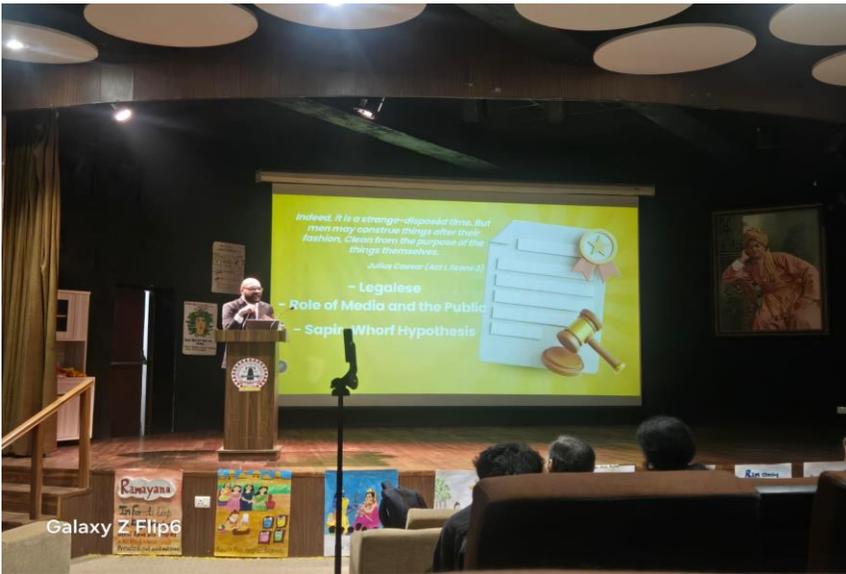

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Noteworthy Points, Conference ‘Take-Aways’ and Lessons Learnt

1. The call for papers received an overwhelming response indicating intense interest generated on national and international level with over a hundred scholars covering numerous states of India and nation-states of the world.
2. The **hybrid mode** allowed for **international outreach**, participation and connectivity contributing to **the economy of the event**, especially as travel costs and overheads were avoided.
3. **The Shakespeare Association, India** and All India Forum for English Students, Scholars and Trainers (**AIFEST**) were the **knowledge partners** and academic allies.
4. International Experts joined in online mode from **Central Europe, Eastern Europe, Australia and America**.
5. **The Live sessions were telecast** and recorded to contribute to the university repository of lectures.
6. **The lecture recordings will be perennially available through the university YouTube channel and Facebook page.**
7. The conference had **transdisciplinary leanings** including linguistics, theory, literature, cognition, culture, media, industry, and AI.
8. The department made a charming use of **Madhubani and Gond art paintings** during the felicitation of the guests. Two **mementos of Lord Buddha were presented to the opening and closing keynote speakers.**
9. **The conference mascot was ‘sophomore,’** conceived as a flying machine and learning bird that appears as a mechanical peacock illustrated in Gond art style. The mascot was well-appreciated and adorned the posters helping the department in branding the conference blending contemporary and traditional aesthetics.
10. The conference **blended mainstream and subaltern perspectives in its various tracks and deliberations.**
11. There was **reference** to flagship initiatives on national and international level including Indian Knowledge System (**IKS**) and Sustainable Development Goals (**SDGs**).
12. **Radio Maharani** agreed to be a Media Partner, thereby adding to the local interest created around the academic event.

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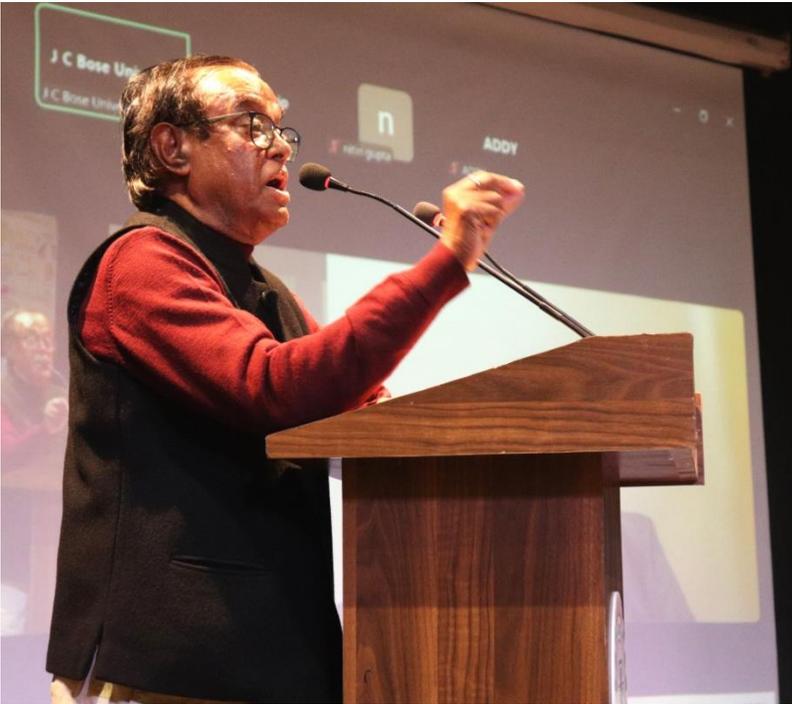

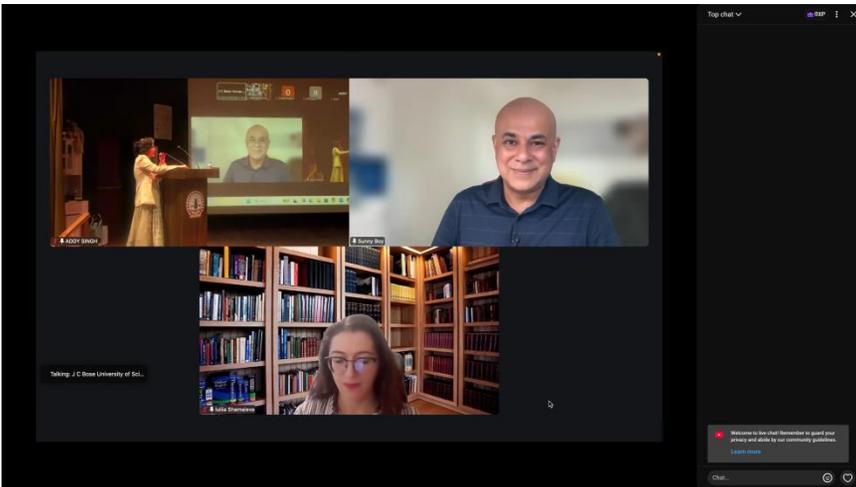

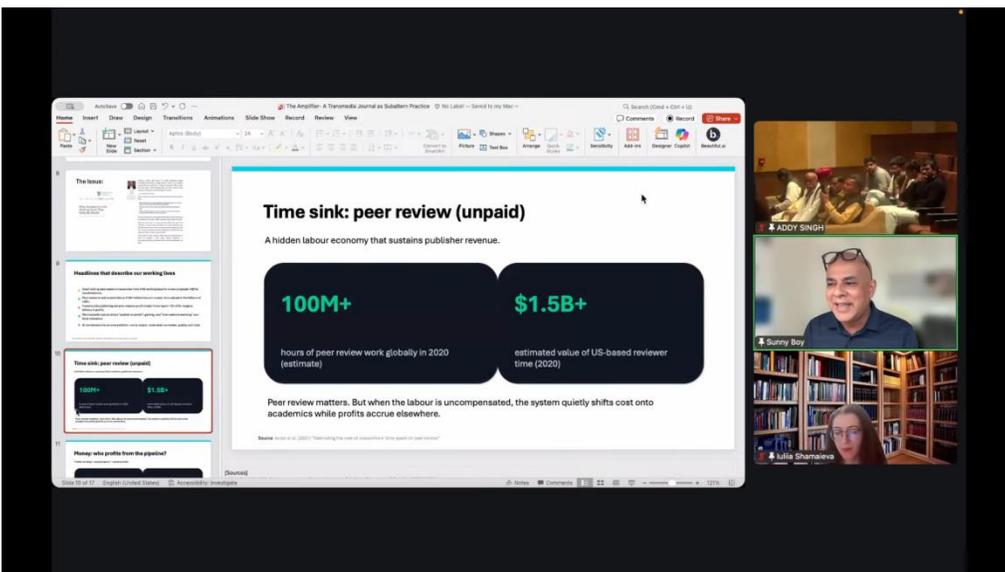

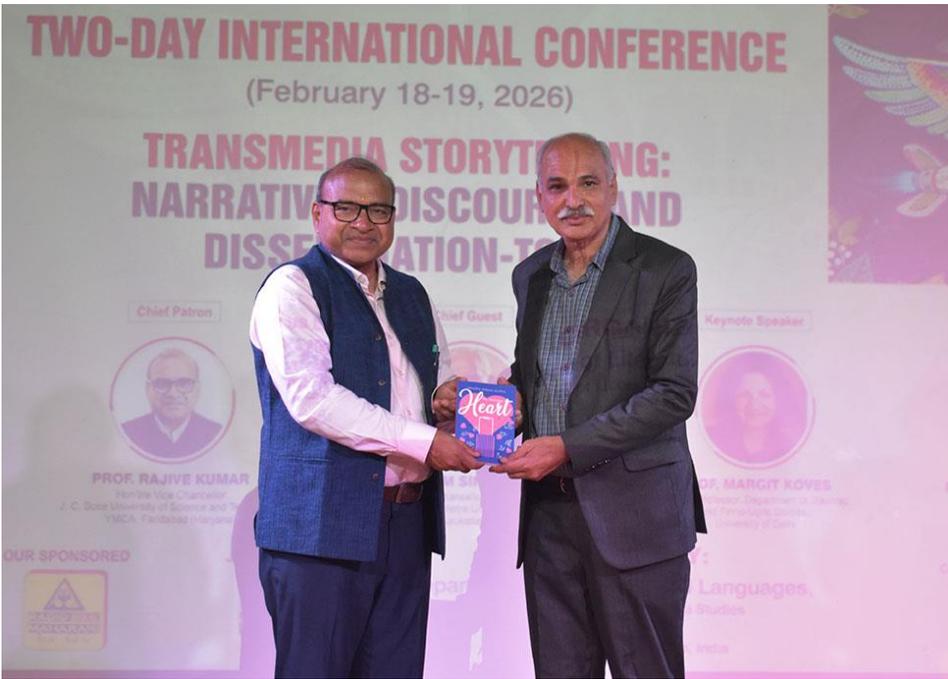
